What's IGO?

One of the best parts of any local u3a is its range of special interest groups. That's why I co-lead Fairford u3a's recorder group and enjoy being part of Cirencester u3a's railbuffers group. In addition, the u3a also provides a range of on-line groups under the "Interest Groups Online" (IGO) banner. I lead or co-lead three IGO groups, namely a book club, a recorder group and a railway group.

Why does IGO exist? One important reason is that it provides interest groups for folk who can no longer get out and about. It does more than that. IGO can bring together people from all over Britain and that brings a wider range of views, outlook and knowledge. IGO groups can provide support for specialist groups which would be unlikely from a single u3a.

IGO currently has about 2000 members and 150 groups. Membership costs £10 a year

There will be an IGO Fair on 11-13 February 2026. This will provide a general introduction to IGO plus one-hour 'taster' sessions for nine groups (including the recorder players' group).

Birds, Botany and Bugs

December 12th WWT Slimbridge. Early rain, nice later.

It rained all the way to Slimbridge, and we went through some dense hill fog! Not a great start! So, on arrival, we all grabbed a hot drink and waited in the Rushy Pen for a few minutes until the sun came out. We had great views of Bewick's swans, pochard, shelduck, tufted ducks and several pintail who kept us entertained. Moving towards the Tower Hide, it became apparent that there were thousands of wildfowl and waders on site today: golden plover, lapwing and dunlin in their thousands, hundreds of curlew, a few ruff, redshank and snipe and, from the Tower, large flocks of feral greylag, Canada and barnacle geese, plus singles of Ross's, brent and Egyptian geese, a thousand starling, and great black-backed gulls.

After lunch, we quickly birded South Lake and the Zeiss Hide, adding cormorant, gadwall and reed bunting, but we decided to return to the Tower Hide to witness the constant swirling masses of waders, all panicked by a peregrine falcon and a sparrowhawk. By this time fourteen common crane and twenty white-fronted geese had also dropped in, as well as four great egret. Skylarks, meadow pipits, linnets, pied and grey wagtails, great spotted woodpecker, chiffchaffs, goldcrest and long-tailed tits were all added to make a great days birding!

Book Circle 2

There are Rivers in the Sky by Elif Shafak

This is an amazing book about a lost, ancient poem, 2 great rivers, and the lives of three main characters from the Assyrian King Ashurbanipal (669-631 BC) to the modern day. Turkey, the Middle East, and London are connected by a single drop of water, over the centuries.

The first character, Arthur, is based on George Smith (1840-1876), a Victorian pioneer and Assyriologist, who first discovered and translated the Epic of Gilgamesh, one of the oldest known written works of literature (this is the Biblical story of the great Flood).

Zaleekhah, a hydrologist trying to recover from a broken marriage, is living on a house boat on the Thames in 2014. As the story unfolds both these people end up at Ninevah, at very different times, on the banks of the other great river, the Tigris, meeting Narin, the third character and her family. Narin's family are Yasidis, an ancient religious sect, feared as witches and much persecuted.

One of our group found the book a bit depressing, but most enjoyed it and found it very enlightening.

Straddlers Walk Tuesday 24th February

Miserden Circular Walk.

This 6.2-mile circular walk, starting from the village shop in Miserden, near Duntisbourne Abbots and Winstone, offers a varied mix of classic Cotswold terrain. It combines village lanes, gently undulating farmland and a number of steady climbs and descents, with several long stretches across open fields. Walkers will pass along farm tracks, quiet roads, and concrete or tarmac drives, as well as woodland paths where the ground can feel enclosed and shaded before opening out again to wide views. Some sections are uphill and sustained, particularly when leaving Duntisbourne and again on the return towards Miserden, making the walk moderately energetic despite its manageable distance. There are some stiles, including a few wooden or concrete ones. Overall, this is a rewarding countryside walk for those comfortable with stiles and mixed underfoot conditions, ranging from grassy fields to firmer tracks and short road sections.
